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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Adhyapak Shikshan Mandal's, C.H. Chaudhari Arts, S.G. Patel commerce & Babaji B.J. Patel Science, college, Taloda is a very small but reputed educational institution in North Maharashtra. It was founded by a great freedom fighter Prin. G.H.Mahajan and some of his like-minded and devoted friends. Prin. G.H.Mahajan was a committed social worker, scholar and writer of great repute. He was an ardent follower of Karmaveer Bhaurao Patil who founded the Rayat Shikshan Sanstha and took education to the grassroots.

Nandurbar district is mostly populated by the poor tribal people. Major parts of the district fall under the inaccessible mountainous terrains of the Satpuda mountain ranges. Due to the geographical inaccessibility of the region there is a severe lack of development and educational infrastructure facilities.

Hence in order to cater to the needs of higher education aspirants, under the aegis of A.S. Mandal, he founded Arts and commerce college trust in 1971 and established this college under its management. It was the only degree college in three tahsils of Taloda, Akkalkuwa and Dhadgaon for two decades.

The college campus is spread over 4.5 acres of land. It provides higher education in Arts, Commerce and Science streams. The college runs 11 UG, 3 PG, 4 research programmes and 2 career oriented courses. College has well equipped laboratories, rich central library, gymnasium, big playground for outdoor sports. Spacious and adequate number of classrooms and other academic and physical support facilities are available. College runs a study centre of Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University. Hundreds of persons and housewives whose education is discontinued due to adverse conditions are given the opportunity to pursue their education and fulfil their educational aspirations.

The college is permanently affiliated to Kavayitri Bahinabai Chaudhari North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon previously known as North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon. It was affiliated to the University of Puna till 1991. The college is approved under section 2(F) and 12(B) of the University Grants Commission Act. It was first accredited by the NAAC in 2004 with 'B' grade and reaccredited in 2012 with 2.68 CGPA.

Vision

1. To impart qualitative and valuable services in the field of education for the socio-economic transformation of the residents of tribal tahsils like Taloda, Akkalkuwa and Dhadgaon.
2. To ensure and inculcate perfect discipline in terms of regularity, sincerity and punctuality among the students from tribal area so that they can contribute to the society as the most responsible citizens.
3. To aim at the personality development of the students through extra-curricular activities like sports, dramas, debating, social gathering, NSS, NCC, etc.
4. To provide platforms to the students by giving them opportunities to face the challenges of competitive world with utmost utilisation of their potential.
5. To create skill and knowledge among students which will empower them to possess basic scientific outlook and eradicate superstitious beliefs.

Mission

To empower the youths of the tribal, rural and underprivileged sections of society by imparting to them high quality education and transform them into ideal citizens of society.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

1. Very good infrastructure with 4.5 acres of lush green land.
2. Very dedicated and motivating management.
3. Good number of program options with choice based credit system.
4. Very good student support facilities with Earn and Learn Scheme, GOI Scholarships, Group Insurance, Active NSS, NCC units and adequate sports facilities.
5. Self-financed 3 UG and 3 PG programs.
6. Dedicated well qualified and competent faculty with good research record.
7. Rich library with more than books and well equipped science and computer laboratories, big playground and sports facilities, gymnasium etc.
8. Good number of research publications and textbook written by faculty.
9. Gender related activities for women's empowerment.
10. Excellent rapport among the teachers and students.

Institutional Weakness

1. First generation learners studying in the most adverse socio-economic conditions.
2. Absence of more career oriented and professional courses.
3. Lack of autonomy in curriculum design.
4. Fewer PG departments.
5. Irregular student attendance due to their agricultural background.
6. Mofussil location of the college in the rural, tribal area.
7. Lack of adequate public transport facilities for the commuters.
8. Limited variety of courses and absence of non- conventional employment oriented courses.
9. Lack of industry-institution collaboration and campus placement opportunities.
10. Restrictions in appointing sufficient permanent staff due to government policies.

Institutional Opportunity

1. The college has greater opportunity to further improve its academic standards given the potential of our students and faculty.
2. We have an opportunity to take more extension activities in the community.
3. The institution has an opportunity to undertake environment conservation projects by utilising the locational advantage of the proximity of the Satpuda Mountains.
4. Scope for student exchange programme with neighbouring colleges.
5. The college can introduce more add-on certificate courses to enhance the employability of the students.
6. Participation of the alumni in the extension activities of the socio-economic, educational importance.

7. To obtain corporate CSR funds for the development of college.
8. Greater scope in achieving excellence in the academic, sports, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.
9. We have a great scope and opportunity to use renewable energy sources, adopt green practices.

Institutional Challenge

1. Imparting education to the rural, tribal learners studying in the most adverse circumstances.
2. Running the self-financed courses in absence of the government support.
3. Developing the college infrastructure and teaching aids with insufficient resources.
4. Enhancing the students participation in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.
5. Building the competitive abilities of the students.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

1. The college is permanently affiliated to Kavayitri Bahinabai Chaudhari North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon (previously known as North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon).
2. The college is offering academic programmes including 11 UG, 03 PG and 04 PG research programmes.
3. All the UG programmes follow the CBCS curriculum.
4. Our college runs 2 short term certificate programmes on the self-financed basis.
5. Our teachers contribute as the chairman and members of various boards of studies and participate in the syllabi designing workshops.
6. For the effective delivery of its curriculum the college adopts and implements the methods and tools like the academic calendar, regular departmental meetings, proper division of workload, preparation of time tables, use of ICT, educational tours, refresher, orientation programmes for the faculty, use of various softwares and feedback mechanism.
7. Our college gives thrust on the co-curricular and extra-curricular activities for the all-round development of the students.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

- 1) College is situated in the mofussil, rural, tribal belt of north Maharashtra
- 2) Most of the students belong to the socio-economically backward classes and many of them are first generation learners.
- 3) We have good number of students coming from the neighbouring Gujrat state
- 4) College implements continuous internal evaluation through classroom tests, classroom seminars, group discussions and internal exams etc.
- 5) College provides ramps, rails and reader allowance to the visually impaired teacher.

- 6) Various student centric teaching methods, tools and teaching aids are used by the college.
- 7) Learning outcomes and aims and objectives of the courses are explained to the students during the initial lectures.
- 8) The institution motivates its faculty to acquire higher qualifications and pursue research and publications.
- 9) College prepares academic calendar and implements its curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities according to the planning of the academic calendar.
- 10) College organises district level Yuvarang Youth Festival and Avishkar research exhibitions.

Research, Innovations and Extension

1. 8 teachers are recognized as research guides by the K.B.C.N.M. University, Jalgaon and 5 research scholars have completed Ph.D. under their guidance. The faculty have published 41 research papers in UGC notified journals and 70 research papers in peer reviewed journals, 79 research papers in conference / seminars / workshops proceedings and 36 books/chapters in books published by different reputed publications.
2. 4 research projects funded by various funding agencies have been completed /ongoing.
3. The college has conducted 7 workshops / seminars under Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) and Industry Academia Innovations.
4. 13 faculty members have been awarded Ph.D. degree. Four laboratories namely Botany, Chemistry, Physics and Zoology are recognized as a research centres by K.B.C.N.M. University, Jalgaon. Also the college has research centre for Ph.D. and M.Phil. in subjects Hindi.
5. The college has constituted Research Advisory Committee to review the research proposals, finalize the topic of research and review periodically and assist in the progress of the research work.
6. UGC and K.B.C.N.M. University, Jalgaon has sanctioned Rs. 6,82,000/- for the Minor Research Projects to the faculty.
7. The college has NSS and NCC units through which we undertake extension activities in the neighborhood community and help in the holistic development of students and the vicinity.
8. The college has conducted extension and outreach programs in the collaboration with various stakeholders of the society. Our students are regularly participated in the extension activities such as Yoga day, Blood donation, Youth Festival, Avishkar, some outreach programmes conducted by ISRO, tree plantation, Bet Bachao Beti Padhavi, Cleanliness Abhiyan, Voters day, Youth day etc.
9. 1 functional MoU and 2 linkages to exchange the research facilities and scientific instruments etc. and expertise with students and faculty mutually.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

1. The college has excellent infrastructure and teaching learning resources including ICT enabled, seminar hall, fully equipped laboratories, computer laboratories, Language Lab and other support facilities.
2. The college has total built up area of 5352.33sq. mtrs. (57591 sq.feet)
3. The college has a campus area of 4.5 acres on the outskirts of the town.
4. It also has the substantial infrastructure required for sports activities like athletics, basketball, volley ball, badminton, table tennis, weight lifting, power lifting, wrestling etc.

5. The Library is partially automated with Integrated Library Management System (LIBMAN Software). It houses a sufficient number of books in all disciplines with the collection of rare books, e-journals etc.
6. The learning resources like INFLIBNET (N-LIST) are available in the library.
7. The Budget for infrastructure, library and other learning resources is earmarked annually based on the recommendations of respective committees constituted for upgrading, maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities.
8. The college maintains an adequate number of computers with 100 Mbps bandwidth internet connection and campus Wi-Fi facility.
9. The college regularly maintains upgrades and enhances its physical, academic and support facilities.

Student Support and Progression

1. The college is having the well-established student support system for financial / scholarship assistance.
2. Nearly 90% of the students are benefitted by the scholarship and freeships provided by the government agencies.
3. University has provided Rs. 3,52,000 to 114 students from the economically weaker sections in the last four years.
4. Earn and learn scheme is functional in the college. In the last five years except-2015-16, college has spent Rs. 3,86,960 under this scheme.
5. University has granted students accidental insurance of Rs.3,15,000 to two students of our college.
6. The college has a healthy system to provide support to students for skill and other development.
7. We try to provide placement camp for student. We organized one placement camp of security guard for students.
8. Reading room facility, INFLIBNET, books for NET / SET guidance, and books for competitive exams are available. Total 489 books for competitive exams are available for students who show their interest in appearing for competitive examinations.
9. The students council is formed as per the rules and regulations laid down by K.B.C.N.M.U. Jalgaon and Maharashtra University act 2016.
10. The college has registered Alumni Association.

Governance, Leadership and Management

1. The vision and mission of the college correlate with the national policies of higher education and are based on education as a means of development of the nation and social reformation.
2. The college translates its vision and mission through programs and activities such as NCC, NSS, soft skills development program, welfare schemes, sports, career guidance, etc.
3. The organizational structure of the institution and college is based on democratic value.
4. The college promotes a culture of decentralization and participative management through various academic and administrative committees.
5. The Principal helps in governing and managing the college through CDC, IQAC, and other college committees.
6. The college encourages the faculty to participate in refresher, orientation, and faculty development programs to complete their M. Phil. and Ph. D and research projects.
7. Study leave and financial support are granted to the faculty for attending seminars, workshops, and conferences.
8. The College has introduced partial e-governance in administration, finance, accounts, student

admissions, and examinations.

9. The institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff
10. The performance of the teaching and non-teaching staff is assessed through the annual performance appraisal system
11. Faculty orientation programmes, seminars, conferences, workshops are organized. Efforts are taken to get in funds from UGC/BCUD etc.
12. The accounts are audited regularly and strictly.
13. IQAC undertakes quality sustenance and quality enhancement measures.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

1. The institution organises gender equity programmes. It has very active Yuvati Sabha (girl students forum) and the various activities for women's safety and security, self-defence, mental and physical health, legal and constitution provisions for women's security and empowerment of women are organised through this forum.
2. Institution provides common room facility for girl students. The common room for the girls is provided with sanitary napkin vending machine through which sanitary napkins are provided at nominal amount of five rupees.
3. The whole campus, library, laboratories and lobbies have been brought under CCTV surveillance to ensure the safety and security of the girls.
4. The college has tried to maintain the campus clean and green. Our botanical garden preserves some rare and endangered varieties of plants.
5. The institution has maintained rain water harvesting unit, bore-well recharge pits, and vermi-compost unit for organic and green manure.
6. College maintains soak pits for the disposal of its liquid waste management.
7. The institution tries its level best to minimise the use of plastic and maintain the campus plastic free.
8. We have tried to maintain the campus friendly for the differently abled person by providing ramps, rails etc..
9. The college has maintained excellent tradition of research promotion and publication in reputed journals and maintains excellent research laboratories
10. College runs Earn and Learn scheme to support the needy and deserving students in their education.
11. The institution strives to maintain transparency in financial, administrative and auxiliary functions by participative management & mechanism.
12. The college makes its physical infrastructure available for different socio-cultural programmes.

The college organises the Blood donation camp and birth and death anniversaries of great Indian personalities to inculcate their message on the young minds.

Criterion 1 - Curricular Aspects

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 The institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

Being affiliated to Kavayitri Bahinabai Chaudhari North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon, the college follows curriculum given by the university and for effective implementation of the curriculum, the college prepares roadmap every year. Highlights of the roadmap are as below:

Academic Calendar Preparation:

- Prior to the commencement of the academic year, the college prepares academic calendar based on the University calendar, which captures the important dates like start and end of the session, internal examination, lab tests, etc.
- This gives clear picture of the available dates for noteworthy activities to ensure proper teaching learning transaction and continuous evaluation. e.g. Organization of workshops, annual gathering, internal examination schedule, etc.

Pre-work at departmental level:

- At the beginning of the academic year, Head of the Department conducts meeting and discusses departmental academic calendar with the staff members for smooth conduct of the activities.
- Discussion of the syllabus with individual teachers.
- Assignment of the workload and timetable to the individual teacher.

Teaching Instructions

Teachers are informed about their workload and courses for next academic year. This helps them to prepare their teaching.

Use of Information and Communication Technology:

- For better understanding of the topics by the students, use of ICT has been increased by the faculty.
- Teachers use power point presentations, animations, video clips, etc for better explanation of the topic

Periodic meetings:

Periodic meetings are held at departmental level by the Head of the department and thus monitor the smooth conduct of teaching-learning process. 2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students, after admission and organises special programs for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

Every good educational institute tries its level best to achieve excellence in educational standards. The deteriorating standards of education in every level and area are the matters of grave concern. Though various factors responsible for it are out of the control of the institution, we try our level best to understand and assess the respective learning levels of the students. The institution caters to the educational needs of the students coming from rural, tribal and very poor family background whose parents are either illiterate or marginally literate. These students work in their agricultures immediately after the college hours and Sometimes as daily wage earners.

Hence the college takes into consideration the varied educational needs of the students and so it becomes essential to identify the slow and advanced learners at the entry level and mentor them accordingly. So at the beginning of every academic year the respective subject teachers conduct informal counselling sessions and class room tests to understand the basics of the students. In these sessions the faculty members make the students aware of their strengths and weaknesses and also the challenges they have to face in their academic career. The students are also counselled about their lacunae and the preparations they have to do to fill to the gaps in their actual and expected levels of the educational standards.

The faculty counsels the students about their goal setting code of conduct, class room attendance, examinations of the college and university and various amenities and support facilities available in the college. Besides the college identifies the slow and advanced to learners on the basis of the previous board and university examination results.

2.5.1 Reforms in Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level

Response:

College has reformed the continuous internal evaluation system time to time. It is fruitful and very effective for students. College conducts internal tests and seminars for the internal continuous assessment of the students. When the admissions are about to be completed the enrolment to the National Service Scheme and National Cadet Corps are commenced. Independence Day celebrations, Gandhi Birth anniversary are celebrated. Blood donation camp is organized on the 1st October. or in the first week of October. Internal examinations of the college are conducted in the first and second week of October. The other co-curricular, extracurricular activities are conducted in August and September. Semester examinations start in the last week of October. The programme of the semester examinations and practical examination are scheduled by the university and has to be followed by the affiliated colleges. For the last few years some papers of the 1st 3rd and 5th semesters are held even during the winter vacations. The University exams continue till the first week of December. The second semester starts in the last week of November.

The preparations for the National Service camp start in the second week of December and the camp is organized in the last week of December. On 12th January, the college celebrates the birth anniversary of Swami Vivekananda and the national Youth Day. Preparations for the university level Yuvarang Youth Festival and the cultural programmes of annual social gathering and Prize distribution function start in the second week of January. Annual social gathering is celebrated in the last week of January and Youth Festival is organized by the university in the last week of January or first week of February. The internal exams are scheduled in the second week of February. Practical exams start in March. The schedule for the university exams and evaluation of answer sheets is prepared by the affiliating university. External (university) exams start in the last week of March and continue till the first week of May.

The college has augmented its infrastructure systematically and continuously over the years. The college has state of the art infrastructural facilities like adequate classrooms, laboratories, computing equipments, staff rooms, restrooms, conference halls, seminar hall, reading room, ramps for the physically challenged students. The college has excellent classrooms to conduct regular classes in the four different building blocks, like Block-A, Block-B, Block-C and Block D. to ensure its optimal utilization, Besides conducting regular classes, the classrooms are used for certificate courses and semester examinations.

Our college is located in Taloda and spread over a campus of 4.50 acres. Our college has total 28 computers. Out of these 06 computers are being used by the office and 22 computers are provided for and different departments, namely commerce lab, computers science lab. we have different ICT, equipments like 2 scanners, 10 printers 5 LCD projectors and 2 Wi-Fi modems,, 1 digital camera, 4 speakers and 1 pro sound amplifiers. Classroom are available for PowerPoint presentation lectures, audio, video film etc. 32 CCTV cameras are provided in the college campus for monitoring day to day activities. To maintain the arrival and departure of faculty, bio-metric machine i.e. thumb impression machine is set. All the computers in college are provided with facilities.College has one BSNL Broad Band internet connection with 100 mbps bandwidth. Internet connection facilities are provided to Principal's cabin, office and NAAC cell, library, computer lab, exam office, commerce lab, language lab, Physics research lab , Zoology and Botany labs in college.

Our institution has adequate facilities for teaching learning like classrooms, laboratories and Computing equipment etc. Having three faculties we have large number of classrooms for teaching and learning. We have 31 classrooms and 01 seminar hall. We have well equipped laboratories of Chemistry, Physics, Botany, Zoology, Geography, Computer Science and Language lab. Language lab has N- Computing system with 1 computer & 15 Monitors. Our institution has a big building of library also. It has reading room. Our library has 46760 books. Our college has a very good computer lab for computer science and commerce students with 06 computers. Our institution also has Ladies room, staff rooms, office, Principal cabin, N.S.S. Rooms, seminar hall etc. Ladies room contains facilities of sanitary napkin vending machine.We also have NAAC cell in our college.

(f) one student each from (a) National Service Scheme, (b) National Cadet Corps, (c) Sports and (d) Cultural activities, nominated by the Principal from the students who are engaged in National service scheme, National Cadet Corps, Sports and cultural activities, respectively.

(g) One teacher as coordinator of the students' council appointed by the Principal of the college and Director, Sports and physical Education, NSS programme Officer and NCC Officer as permanent invites.

6.2.2 Organizational structure of the institution including governing body, administrative setup, and functions of various bodies, service rules, procedures, recruitment, promotional policies as well as grievance redressal mechanism

Response:

The college is permanently affiliated to KBC NMUniversity, Jalgaon and is governed by Adhyapak Shikshan Mandal. The college is having two-tier systems for its governance. At the management level college is governed by the President, the Vice President, Treasurer and the Secretary. At the college level, the Principal is at the apex of the internal administration and is assisted by the Vice-principal, office superintendent, Heads of the departments, staff, and IQAC. The apex body of the college is Management board.

Administrative Setup:

The administrative setup consists of the Principal followed by the Vice-principal, Office Superintendent, Accountant, Head Clerk, Junior Clerks, Assistants and Attendants.

The organization of departments includes Heads of Departments, Associate Professors, Assistant Professors stage-1 and 2, Librarian and a Physical Director.

The formal organizational structure of the library staff includes the Librarian, Library Clerk, and Library Assistants.

Organizational structure of the Department of Physical Education and Sports includes a Director of Physical Education and the sports committee.

Service Rules: For the service conditions and rules, the college follows the rules and regulations laid down by KBC NMU, Jalgaon, UGC, New Delhi and the Government of Maharashtra.

Procedures for Recruitment: The college staff recruitment is carried out in two different ways:

- a) Permanent Posts (Grant-in-aid): These posts are recruited by the Government of Maharashtra according to the norms of the University and UGC.
- b) Temporary Posts (Non-Grant): These posts are recruited by the institution Management according to the norms of the University and UGC.

Procedures for Promotion: The promotion is allotted according to KBC NMUniversity, Jalgaon, UGC, New Delhi and Government of Maharashtra.

Grievance Redressal Mechanism: The College has Anti Sexual Harassment Committee, Anti-ragging Committee, and Discipline Committee for timely redressal of the students and the faculty's grievances.

Mechanisms for grievance redressal:

- a) **Students direct access to authorities** – Students can directly approach the Principal, the Vice-principal and Heads of the Departments to put up their grievances.
- b) **Students suggestion Box** – The students can put their complaints in written form in the suggestion box kept in the campus. The box is opened periodically and the authorities take cognizance of the grievances and suggest appropriate measures.
- c) **Student Council** - The grievances of students are also received through the members of the student council, and the appropriate measures are taken care of.
- d) **Open Discussion with employees** - Primarily, the Principal, the Vice-principal and the office superintendent resolve the grievances of employees through open discussions and interactions.

Apart from this, the college trust mobilizes funds through donation from individuals, Self-financed courses, and admission fees and from other sources is used for the resource mobilization.

The financial sources of the college are:

- The budgetary resources of the college include Plan and non-plan grants received from UGC.
- Salary grant is received from Government of Maharashtra.
- Grants received from K.B.C NM University, Jalgaon under the Quality Improvement Programme (QIP) for carrying out various academic programmes like seminars, conferences workshops, and expert lecture series.
- 70 percent Grants are received from K.B.C NM University, Jalgaon for implementing the Earn & Learn Scheme and 100% for the N.S.S.
- Grant received from K.B.C NM University, Jalgaon for VCRMS Research Project.
- EBC and BC scholarship grants are received from Government of Maharashtra and India.
- Admission, tuition and other fees are collected by the college from students, medical reimbursement grant and other grants (Bank Interest, canteen rent, Common dues, fees charged for issue of certificates)
- Gymkhana fees.

Optimum utilization of financial resources:

Following system is adopted by the college for the optimal utilization of resources;

- The College invites requirements from all departments and accordingly prepares the budgetary plan.
- Purchase Committee works on the details of the requirements, available resources and procurement.
- College governing body sanctions the amount by considering financial resources and needs of the departments.
- The utilization of the sanctioned budget is monitored by governing body of the institution.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes

Response:

In the pursuance for quality assurance, quality up-gradation, assessment and accreditation, and institutionalization of quality culture, the college has established the Internal Quality Assurance Cell. Since then IQAC has become instrumental in suggesting a number of quality improvement measures in the college.

The two examples of practices institutionalized as a result of IQAC initiatives are given as under:

Augmentation of teaching-learning facilities

To cope up with the changing competitive scenario IQAC has tried to keep pace with the ICT enabled teaching learning process. As a result of this over the years. IQAC has started to facilitate the teaching-learning process. E-journals, LIBMAN software for library, INFLIBNET, local chapter for online courses, e-books database and internet connection are available for the students and staff. The teachers of the college are having their blogs.

Enriching Research Culture in the College.

IQAC of the college plays an important role in inculcating research culture in the college. Due to the efforts taken by IQAC at present, 13 faculty members have been awarded Ph. D degree. The college has three research centers for Ph.D. 05 faculty members are recognized research supervisors in various subjects and 05 research scholars have completed Ph.D. under their guidance. The college teachers have published 41 research papers in the journals notified by UGC, 79 papers published in conferences/workshops/symposiums, 36 books/chapters in various publications and 01 Major and 04 Minor Research Projects completed/ongoing during the last five years.

Organization and Participation of students in the Avishkar.

The college has organized 02 Seminars/Conferences/ Workshops in the last five years.

Besides the IQAC has taken following initiatives for the institutionalization of the quality culture in the college;

- Preparation of Academic Calendar and formation of college committees.
- The college has introduced 06 new programmes (3 Degree, 01 research and 02 Certificate) in the

last five years.

- IQAC conducts periodic meetings and takes stock of teaching learning process.
- IQAC submits Annual Quality Assurance Reports (IQAR) and self study reports (SSR)
- IQAC monitors the work of various committees
- Collection and analysis of feedback from all the stakeholders.

The College reviews its teaching-learning process internal tests and assessments and learning outcomes at periodic intervals through IQAC.

Following are two examples of institutional reviews and implementation of teaching-learning reforms facilitated by IQAC

Structured feedback and Review of learning outcomes:

Feedback is a vital part of the teaching-learning process. The analysis of the effectiveness of teaching learning is made through the stakeholder's feedback mechanism. It helps the mentor to recognize how the students know his or her subject being taught. The collection and analysis of feedback from different stakeholder helps the institution to understand the needs of society and what other stakeholders foresee from the college. Keeping this view at the center, IQAC has developed well-structured feedback systems. IQAC prepares various feedback forms and collects structured feedback on design and review of syllabus and student feedback on teachers. Each department analyzes the feedback and submits a consolidated report to IQAC. IQAC prepares an inclusive feedback report for further improvement and implementation.

Students learning outcomes are reviewed through class tests, assignments, class seminars, field projects, internal assessment tests, and university examinations. University result analysis is made for each semester at the department level and is discussed in IQAC/CDC, meetings for further improvement and implementation. This helps in identifying the slow and advanced learners. Effective teaching achieves its success only if it is well planned. And, hence for the proper planning of teaching each teacher is provided timetable, annual/semester wise. Teaching, workload, actual teaching units, daily teaching is done as per the time table and time table committee guidelines.

Besides this, IQAC has reviewed and implemented teaching-learning process through the following ways:

Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) for all UG (First and Second Year) is implemented

Use of ICT in teaching and learning is encouraged.

Proper implementation of the teaching learning and assessment programmes.

INFLIBNET, database, and internet connection in library for student and faculty.

UGC-COC/Skill Based/ courses are introduced.

The college employed various student-centric learning methods such as class seminars, field visits, group discussions, tutorials, class tests, home assignments, projects etc.

The solid waste of the college is used for making organic manure for the botanical garden and some of the solid waste is used for producing the vermi-compost. It is again used for plants and botanical garden as organic fertilizer for the botanical garden.

The college disposes all its liquid waste in the soak pits created for liquid disposal. No amount of liquid waste is released in the stream or any river. All the liquid waste from laboratories and washrooms is managed by percolating it in the soak pits.

The college does not produce any e-waste and so there is no problem of managing e-waste. College does not allow the use of plastic in the campus and so there is little or no plastic waste in the campus.

Besides, the college has a rain water harvesting structure for its new building. All the rain water from the building is harvested and recharged into the recharge pits. It helps to maintain the ground water level of the area.

The college administration tries to maintain the campus as green and eco-friendly as possible and prevents every kind of pollution.

7.1.6 Rain water harvesting structures and utilization in the campus

Response:

The college has shown utmost care and sensitivity towards green and eco-friendly practices. College has maintained its campus very green and ecofriendly. Water is an elixir of life and very valuable for our survival. So in order to maintain the fast depleting underground water resources of the region, we have started recharging the college campus with rain water. In order to tap the rain water and recharge underground, we have constructed a rain waterharvesting project. Our new building of 'A' block has been provided with the rain water harvesting unit and all the rain water collected through the pipes is submerged into the big soak pit and is allowed to percolate into the soil. In this way all the rain water is recharged in the soil and it helps to maintain the underground water table. As all the water requirement of the college is fulfilled by pumping water from the submersible tube well, water recharging is the crying need of the time and the institution intends to harvest the rain water from all the possible sources.

Title of the Practice: Motivation for Research

Objectives of the Practice :

- 1) To motivate and support the faculty to pursue doctoral research and post-doctoral research.
- 2) To motivate the faculty to undertake research supervision to produce research scholars.
- 3) To encourage and support the faculty to undertake major and minor research projects and to secure UGC,DST,BCUD,VCRMSand ICSSR funds for the same.
- 4) To motivate the faculty members to actively participate and present their research papers in various conferences and symposia.
- 5) To Publish quality research articles in reputed journals with good impact factor.
- 6) To publish good quality academic and research books.

The Context :- Development in Science and technology is the most essential for the development of any country. Hence promoting research and motivating the researchers is very crucial for India to progress. Besides we have entered in the era of knowledge based society in which the creation of knowledge is very crucial. Creation, storage and transfer of knowledge can only make the society stronger and self sufficient. Hence giving emphasis on research is very necessary in a developing nation like India. So the institution tries to enable its faculty to pursue research in their respective disciplines and if possible in the inter disciplinary areas. The college supports its faculty to get research funds from various funding agencies-and to obtain the required facilities. The reputation of any educational institution depends on the quality of research that takes place there and hence the college has been giving thrust on research and innovation for last several years.

The Practice :

- Faculty members are encouraged to participate and present their research papers in national, international seminars, conferences and the college provides duty leave for the same.

- Faculty members are motivated to apply for the research grants from various funding agencies and supported for the same.
- The College Provides computing and internet Facility, e-journals, INELIBNET etc. for research scholars and teachers.
- Students are motivated to participate and present their research projects in AVISHKAR for developing their research attitude.
- The College organizes seminars, conferences and short term courses for a good research exposure.
- *College organizes seminars, conference, short term programmes to motivate its faculty.*

Evidence of Success :

After the implementation of the promotion of research we have achieved good research outcome both in quality and quantity. We have achieved great success in publication as well.

Right now the college has 13 faculty members with Ph.D degree and 05 with M. Phil degrees. The institution has doctoral research centres in Botany, Physics, Zoology and Hindi, 05 faculty members have been recognized as research guides by our affiliating university KBCNMU, Jalgaon. 05 Ph.D scholars have obtained their M. Phil under their able guidance. 8 teachers are recognized as research guides by the K.B.C.N.M. University, Jalgaon and 5 research scholars have completed Ph.D. through our research centres. Our faculty have published 41 research papers in UGC notified journals and 70 research papers in peer reviewed journals. They have presented 79 research papers in various national , international conference / seminars etc. The faculty have written/ contributed 36 text books/chapters in books published by different reputed publications. The institution motivates the students to participate in Avishkar research exhibitions. The college organises 'Avishkar' research exhibition to give research exposure to the students.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:-

CBCS and semester system leaves little time for the faculty to devote time for the research.

- 2) Research laboratories need to be constantly upgraded.
- 3) Lack of financial resources and technical support staff.
- 4) Keeping the faculty constantly motivated for continuous research.
- 5) Fewer funds for research projects from the UGC, and the affiliating university.

II Earn & Learn Scheme :-

Objectives of the practice :-

- 1) To establish and inculcate the dignity of labour among the students.
- 2) To financially support the economically weaker students.
- 3) To enable the students to be financially self-sufficient at least for supporting their education.

4) To bridge the gap between actual need and availability of the non-teaching staff.

5) To maintain and co-operate the support facilities of the institution.

Context :-Our institution has been catering to the educational needs of the poor, rural tribal students. They mostly belong to the underprivileged sections of society. They take their education under the most adverse conditions due to various kinds of deprivations. Hence supporting these students financially is the very crucial and most essential to enable them to complete education.

Besides it is also essential for inculcating the ideal of the dignity of labour on the young minds since the dignity of labour is fast diminishing from our work culture. Besides, the students of the college belonging to the BPL (Below the poverty Line) families need financial support very badly. Sometimes they have to give up their education due to the financial constraints. To avoid this and enable them to continue their education and fulfill their aspirations. It helps for the great cause of the upliftment of the poor and needy- and helps the students as confidence & morale booster.

Practice :-

1) The institutions issues notice at the beginning of every academic year and invites applications from the needy and deserving students coming from the BPL families.

2) The students who apply for enrolling under the scheme are interviewed and the needy, deserving and eligible ones are identified and selected.

3) The students selected under the scheme are assigned the manual works in various support facilities of the college like library, laboratories and various departments. Their daily attendance is recorded and they have to work for three hours per attendance.

4) The affiliating university bears the 70 % share of the students' wages

And the college administration bears the 30 % of the cost of the scheme

Problems Encountered and Resources Required :-

- 1) The college faces the problem of admitting more number of students as the affiliating university allows only 1.5 % students under the scheme.
- 2) The institution faces the problem of more number of students who need and seek the benefits than can be permitted.
- 3) The college faces resource crunch to admit more number of students to be benefitted under the scheme.
- 4) Though 30 % expenses are borne by the college, college needs more resources.
- 5) The wages of 90 rupees per attendance is very meagre amount to cover up the educational expenses of out station students so the amount of wages needs to be increased.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 Describe/Explain the performance of the institution in one area distinctive to its vision, priority and thrust

Response:

The institution has been catering to the educational needs of the most backward, poor and underprivileged sections of society with the best possible support facilities.

2) Our college has been founded by the noted social worker, freedom fighter, scholar and educationist Prin. G.H.Mahajan. He had mobilized the like minded, committed social workers for taking education to the rural, tribal and most marginalized sections of society. Their goal was to take education to the grassroots

for the upliftment of the most underprivileged sections

3) The college was founded and developed in the most adverse circumstances facing acute financial resource crunch.

4) The college is situated in the small mofussil town at the foothills of the Satpuda mountain ranges. The area is surrounded by small backward villages and hamlets. Even the town people mostly depend on the agriculture of their livelihood.

5) Inclusive development and the upliftment of the socio-economically and educationally backward strata of society should be the aim of educational institute. And our institution has been continuously striving to take education to the people who were denied the right to education and thus opportunities to develop and raise their standards of living.

6) Hence, serving the poorest people of society through the means of education has been the driving force for the management. In view of this, the college is taking high strides in making available the best possible educational services.

7) Vision and mission of the college is to impart best possible means and help the youths to break the vicious circle of poverty and illiteracy. So presently the college is offering 11 UG and 03 PG and 04 doctoral research centers, 02 value added and 01 certificate programmes. The campus of the college is spread over 4.50 acres of land on the outskirts of the town. The campus is very beautiful and surrounded by lush green trees. We provide best possible physical infrastructure facilities with adequate number of classrooms, staffrooms, library, laboratories, office, reading room, gymnasium, common room and seminar hall etc.

- In order to cater to the needs of the aspiring youths, the college is constantly upgrading and developing its physical infrastructure, We have upgraded and equipped well our laboratories. At present we have 03 physics laboratories, 03 chemistry laboratories, 03 botany laboratories, 02 Zoology, 01 computer science, one geography and one laboratory for language. Our library is considerably rich library in the district.
- **The most striking & distinctive example of our college is that more than 70% of our students belong to the schedule tribes and 90 % of our students belong to the backward classes. And every year we give admissions to more than 70 % tribal students. These tribal students are mostly the first generation learners belonging to the lowest stratum of society. Our college has been most instrumental in changing the socio-economic scenario of the area. Most of the graduates in this area have been produced by our college. Maximum number of our students come from the remote, inaccessible & backward villages in the Satpuda mountain ranges and take education in the most adverse circumstances.**

- The central library of the college is very rich with rare books and references. It is partially automated and it uses integrated management system known as LIBMAN software consisting of modules like book circulation and OPAC, besides the library has INELIBNET and N-LIST programme for e-books, e-journals and MIS reports.
- The college has well-equipped gymnasium. It has modern gym equipments. The college is the nursing home for the best athletes. We have won the general championship in athletics for many years successively. Our tribal students are the strength of our college and give best performance in

the athletic sports competitions.

In view of achieving its goals the college is offering total 11 undergraduate, 03 postgraduate, 04 Ph.D. Programmes and 02 short term value added Programmes
- The institution has sufficient campus area of 4.5 acres. The institution has been unremittingly developing its infrastructure to cater to the growing needs of the students. Now the college has adequate number of classrooms, staff rooms, library, reading rooms, laboratories, gymnasium playground etc.
- In order to cater to the growing needs of the ever increasing strength of students we have expanded our laboratories and upgraded them with latest lab equipments and instruments.
- The college has well established instrumentation facility center with modern analytical equipments.
- College has a very rich central library with library management system and other softwares like INILIBNET presently the central library of the college has more than 46760 books.
